QARC March Meeting Minutes

Meeting called to order by President Mike VE3OX at 7:33 PM.

Guests: Brian Williams (who is currently taking the Basic Course.)

Announcements:

Star Trophies in Belleville donated a desk/pen set for a door prize. Keith VA3KRV donated a refurbished Heathkit Square wave generator.

Saturday breakfasts are going well. Location is still at the Quinte Restaurant, 135 Cannifton Rd. Attendances have been as high as 14 people.

Tim VE3UO announced that the Belleville Community Policing 'Pitter-Patter' run is to be held Sunday April 9. The run starts at 10 AM - we should be on site by 9 AM to get location assignments. The run is supposed to be held at Loyalist college, but it is unknown if the current OPSEU strike will require a change of location. Note: Anyone who has NOT participated will be required to complete a Police background check - contact Tim VE3UO for the form.

Basic Course: First night was held March 13 with seven students signed up. Course is running Mondays and Wednesdays with the exam scheduled for Monday May 8. ARES Report: Peter VE3UR reported that VHF/UHF dual band radios for the 4 QHC locations have arrived.

Beast Kids Run is to be held Sunday June 4. Contact Peter VE3UR to volunteer. MS Super Cities walk is to be held Sunday May 28. Contact Ron VE3IVC to volunteer. Repeater Report: Tim VE3UO made a motion to purchase 100' of buri-flex coax for a sum not to exceed \$150 to replace the coax at the Repeater site. Seconded by Peter VE3UR. The motion was CARRIED. The coax will be part of the bulk purchase by the Prince Edward Radio Club from Maple leaf Communications and will have a N-connector installed at one end. Installation will take place this summer.

New Entry Level Certificate

The RAC Board of Directors has authorized the formation of an Advisory Committee under the leadership of Midwest Director Bj Madsen, VE5FX, to examine whether Industry Canada should be asked to institute a new Entry Level Certificate for the Amateur Service in Canada. The committee is considering the very successful entry level Foundation License that has been implemented in the UK and Australia to encourage youth to take an interest in science and radio and to promote growth in amateur radio. The committee will seek input from Canadian radio amateurs as to what should be done in Canada. Ontario QSO Party

The Ontario QSO party will be held April 15 & 16. It starts at 1800 UTC 2PM local time on Saturday and ends at 1800 UTC Sunday. More information is available at http://cco.ve3xd.com/oqp/index.htm.

Ontario QSO Party Rules

The Ontario QSO Party is open to all amateur radio operators regardless of license class and shortwave listeners world-wide.

Objective: For Ontario stations to contacts as many amateur radio stations as possible on as many bands as possible world-wide.

For stations outside Ontario to make as many contacts with Ontario amateur radio stations as possible.

Frequencies: (Phone/CW) All HF Bands 160-10 meters with the exception of the WARC bands. All VHF/UHF Bands.

Suggested Frequencies for Mobiles/QRP:

HF SSB: 1.870, 3.735, 3.860, 7.070, 7.260, 14.130, 14.265, 21.260, 28.360 HF CW: 1.830, 3.530, 3.720, 7.030, 7.130, 14.030, 21.030, 21.130, 28.030

VHF/UHF SSB: 50.130, 144.205, 432.105 VHF/UHF FM: 52.540, 146.550, 446.100

Suggested Manner of Operation: Work HF SSB on the hour, work HF CW on the half hour, work VHF/UHF (either SSB/CW or FM Simplex) at 15 minutes past the hour.

Use of FM: Operators can not use repeaters for either contest contacts or for soliciting contacts. Please keep the FM Simplex calling frequency of 146.520 MHz. clear.

Categories: Multi-operator, Single Operator Low Power (under 150 watts HF and under 50 watts VHF/UHF only), Single Operator High Power (over 150 watts HF and over 50 watts VHF/UHF only), Single Operator Single Band, Single Operator HF QRP (under 5 watts), VHF/UHF Band-Restricted (for those with VHF/UHF privileges only) CW-only, SSB-only or Mixed Mode, SWL, Mobile/Rover.

A mobile station is a station that moves between multiplier areas operating from a vehicle (either stopped or in motion) only using antennas that have the capability of being used while in motion.

A rover station is a station that moves between multiplier areas but may operate using antennas that do not have the ability to be used while the vehicle is in motion.

Mobile and rover stations are encouraged to sign "/M", "/R", or the equivalent on phone so that other operators can anticipate their moves to a new multiplier area.

Exchange: Ontario stations send signal report and county, district, regional municipality or city in the case of the Cities of Toronto, Sudbury, Ottawa, Hamilton and Kawartha Lakes The "Towns" of Haldimand and Norfolk are considered a single multiplier. Non-Ontario stations send signal report and Canadian province/territory, U.S. state, or DXCC country name.

Scoring: Ontario stations work everyone. Non-Ontario stations work Ontario stations only. Mobile/Rover stations may be worked again when they change multiplier areas. SWL's only log Ontario stations.

Score 1 QSO point for each station worked on SSB per HF band. Score 2 QSO points for each station worked on CW per HF band. (You may work a station TWICE per HF band, once on SSB and once on CW).

On the VHF/UHF bands you may only work a station ONCE per VHF/UHF band regardless of mode. Score 5 QSO points for each station worked per band. Score 10 QSO points for each contact made with CCO club station VA3CCO, ODXA club station VE3ODX, and RAC Ontario club station VA3RAC. (You may work VA3CCO, VE3ODX and VA3RAC twice per HF band i.e. SSB & CW and once on each of the VHF/UHF bands).

Ontario stations claim 1 multiplier point for each of the 48 multiplier areas worked on each band. Ontario stations also claim 1 multiplier point for each Canadian province/territory, U.S. state and DXCC country worked on each band.

Non-Ontario stations and SWL's claim Ontario multipliers only.

Total Score = Total QSO points x total multiplier points.

Mobile/Rover Bonus: Mobile/Rover stations add 300 bonus points for each Ontario multiplier activated. To earn the mobile/rover bonus a station must make at least three contacts with three different stations from the multiplier area.

Use of DX spotting networks:

There are no "penalties" of any kind for using DX spotting networks.

AWARDS:

Certificates to the top scoring stations in each category and to the top scoring stations in each Ontario county, district, regional municipality and the City of Toronto. Regional certificates will be issued to the top scoring stations in each region of Ontario i.e.

Northern Ontario (postal code area P), Southwestern Ontario (postal code area N, Central Ontario (postal code area L) and Eastern Ontario (postal code area K).

Certificates will also be awarded to the top scoring stations in each Canadian province/territory, U.S.A. state and DXCC country.

CCO Award "New award"

CCO Plaque to the top scoring Rover or Mobile station.

ODXA "Clean Sweep Award"

This plaque will be awarded to the very first station who manages to make contact with each of the 48 Ontario multipliers plus VE3ODX and VA3RAC.

Naturally, if you have managed to obtain a "clean sweep" you'll need to record the time in your log that this happened.

ORP Award

Thanks to Jeff Heatherington, VA3JFF and his better half there will be a special QRP Award in the Ontario QSO Party going to:

- a) The top scoring QRP entrant from Ontario
- b) The top scoring QRP entrant from outside Ontario

The award will be a 5 x 7 " cross-stitched award in a frame featuring a checkerboard border, a graphic of a straight key, "ONTARIO QSO PARTY 2005", the winning station's callsign in white against the black straight key...along with "TOP QRP" or "TOP NON-VE3 QRP".

Durham Radio Award

Thanks to Keith Carcasole of Durham Radio a special plaque will be awarded to the top scoring single operator station.

Radio World Award

Thanks to the folks at Radio World a special plaque will be awarded to the top scoring multi-operator station.

ODXA Newbie Award

Will be awarded to the highest scoring entrant who has not previously been an entrant in the Ontario QSO Party.

Frank S. Salter (VE3FRS) Memorial Award

Thanks to Ron Walsh VE3GO this award will go to the top scoring entrant from eastern Ontario (postal code area "K")

ODXA "Outside Ontario" Award

This award will go to the top scoring station from outside the province of Ontario
